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Chancellor visits Kaimosi Friends University College

The Chancellor of Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology, Dr. Peter Wanyaga Muthoka, on Friday, 19th October 2018 visited the Kaimosi Friends University College (KAFUCO) as part of his mandate as outlined in the MMUST Charter. Earlier in May 2018, the Chancellor had visited MMUST in his inaugural tour of the University since he became the Chancellor on 14th December 2017. Next on his visitation tour is to Turkana University College; the youngest constituent college of Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology.

In his address to staff and students of KAFUCO, the Chancellor called on every one to embrace the culture of peace, harmony, dialogue and tolerance as is currently being observed in Kenya. He said that it is important to respect inclusivity in order to have a sustainable life. Dr. Muthoka lauded KAFUCO for the growth so far experienced since his last visit almost forty four years ago. He urged the KAFUCO Council to align their Strategic Plan to encompass the current Presidential Big Four Agenda, Vision 2030 and the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

In her part, the KAFUCO Chairperson of Council, Dr. Bernadette Mungai said the College was committed to its course after it successfully transited from a Campus to a University College. She pledged to nurture the College into an excellent teaching, research and innovation hub. She was grateful to MMUST for being a good mother to KAFUCO.




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The Vice Chancellor of MMUST, Prof. Fredrick Otieno, reiteared on his vision five years ago when he joined the University of building a world class student-centred University. According to him, such a University is characterized by quality teaching and learning, cutting edge research, innovation and consultancy. He was proud to mention that under his leadership, the MMUST had registered exponential growth in its webometric ranking from a distant position 24 to the current position 7. He said his vision was to now move MMUST to the top three universities in Kenya by 2021. He was grateful to the Chancellor for the guidance and support he continues to accord MMUST. Further, the VC encouraged KAFUCO to build a strong, academic and financial stable College as they pursue the attainment of a Charter in a few years to come.

MMUST-DW AKADEMIE Media Forum Tackles Corruption In The Kenyan Media


Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology (MMUST) and Maseno University Journalism and Mass Communication students were part of the MMUST-DW (Deutsche Welle) Akademie Media Open Forum HELD at the University grounds on 18th October 2018. The Forum's key agenda was sensitizing upcoming media practitioners on corruption in the media and help provide mitigating mechanisms on how to tackle the issue of corruption in the media.

Maseno University and MMUST Journalism students took part in the discussions interactive group on corruption in the media. Bribery, nepotism and 'Cash on News Coverage' were some of the main forms of corruption that the students highlighted after the discussions. However, accrediting of iournalists and enforcement of strict media laws against corruption were recommended as measures to curb the thriving corruption in the Kenyan media.

Juta Vom Hofe (Country Coordinator, DW Akademie), said that corruption in the media extends to Germany as well, where 70% of journalists have been approached by interest groups seeking to kill stories. However, German laws are very strict and a journalist found guilty of corruption serves time in jail.

It was evident during the event that the market is proud of MMUST Alumni making great strides in the media industry. The mentors encouraged the students to uphold integrity and adhere to media ethics during practice.

Mr. Fred Mariwa, a media trainer and Josephine Wareta (KBC, Kisumu), both DW Akademie Alumni, accompanied the DW team. The Journalism and Mass Communication Department (JMC) was well represented by the Chairman, Dr. Peres Wenje and lecturers alongside Kevin Omolo (Standard Newspaper; Kisumu Bureau), Maurine Onganga Ondiro (Brand TV) and Cate Kulo (Programs Manager at Nyota FM).



MMUST In Pursuit of the President's Big Four Agenda

A team of scholars and researchers from Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology (MMUST), led by the Executive Dean, School of Natural Sciences (SONAS), Prof. William Shivoga, has come up with Big Four Agenda Research thematic priority areas in line with the Presidential Big Four Agenda for submission to the National Commission for Science, Technology and Innovation (NACOSTI).

On 12th December 2017, H.E President Uhuru Kenyatta announced his new plan, the 'Big Four', which would guide the development agenda of Kenya in the period 2018-2022. The plan focuses on key basic needs that are critical in uplifting the standard of living of Kenyans on the path to becoming an upper middle-income country by 2030. Prioritized are affordable and decent housing, healthcare, affordable food and nutritional security, and employment creation through manufacturing. These four areas are expected to bolster strong and inclusive economic growth.

The current Masinde Muliro University of Science and Technology(MMUST) 2015/16-2019/20 Strategic Plan sets out to; increase student enrollment in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics to produce human resource capacity equipped with requisite technological and scientific for development: skills needed relation of University education to the needs of society; the gender mainstreaming; improvement of teaching through application of ICT and pedagogic principles; enhancement of research, innovation community outreach and and development for transformation of society in line with Vision 2030, the African Union(AU)2063 and Sustainable Development Goals(SDGs).

The Big 4 Agenda





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In 2016, MMUST was declared a Technical, Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institution by the Ministry of Education. This requires the University to develop Certificate, Diploma and Degree programmes geared towards competency training and acquisition of skills in TVET fields. In the current Strategic Plan, the University is to establish and equip an institute of technical vocational education and training to spearhead training, research and extension activities in appropriate technology creation, innovation and transfer. In this regard, the University is establishing and operationalizing а TVET Institute and developing TVET programmes hence it is seeking financial support to equip TVET workshops and laboratories.

Over the years, a number of achievements have been realized. Student enrolment has increased from 7,004 in 2009 to 17,571 by 2017. Similarly, development of physical infrastructure and acquisition of equipment for teaching basic science courses has been enhanced. Recently, the University through partnership with the African Development Bank (AfDB) has been able to acquire newer and advanced technological equipment to support STEM courses. Furthermore, the University has also established linkages with local and international partners including the French Agreenium Consortium. The University has introduced a number of STEM programmes recognised by the Commission for University of Education (CUE) and accreditation by relevant

professional bodies in Engineering, Nutrition, Nursing and Medical Laboratory, Medicine and the TVET. However, the University has also experienced a number of challenges viz: low development of physical facilities and modern equipment to match the growing number of students.

MMUST is, therefore, striving towards creating its own niche in relation to the Big Four Agenda. In the subsequent **MMUST NewsPost** publication, focus shall be centered on the research thematic priority areas:

Increasing Food Security And Household Incomes

Manufacturing, Employability And Entrepreneurship

Achieving Universal Healthcare Coverage In Kenya
